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## **Executive Summary**

#### District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

**Mission:** With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

#### School Collection Development Plan

Westridge MS serves 1200 students enrolled in grades sixth through eighth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 50% Hispanic and 50% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 49% White, 46% Black, 0% Native, 2% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 2% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Nicole L. Jefferson, Assistant Principal Fabiola Guillaume, and Assistant Principal Emilio Vitulli. Westridge MS is proud to offer many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include SGA, Battle of the Books, Book Club, Book Fair, Latinos in Action, Chorus, Band, Tech Sassy Girlz, Debate Club, and Intramural Sports such as: Soccer, Volleyball, Basketball, and Track.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Westridge MS indicates that the average age of the collection is 2010 and the number of books per student is 8. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Westridge MS does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Reading proficiency increased in 7th and 8th grade during the 2022-23 school year.
  - o 6th grade proficiency in reading decreased.
- The average age of the collection is 2010.
- Fiction availability currently resides at 57% and Non-Fiction availability currently resides at 38%
- Science and Technology collections need updating to current standards as the average age of books is 2010.

#### Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data.

## **Collection Analysis**

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.
